This month for Educational I looked up the California State Gem:

Benitoite (ben-EE-toe-ite)



Benitoite is a rare blue <u>barium titanium silicate mineral</u>, found in <u>hydrothermally</u> altered <u>serpentinite</u>. Benitoite <u>fluoresces</u> under short wave <u>ultraviolet light</u>, appearing bright blue to bluish white in color. The more rarely seen clear to white benitoite crystals fluoresce red under long-wave UV light.

It was first described in 1907 by George D. Louderback, who named it *benitoite* for its occurrence near the headwaters of the <u>San Benito River</u> in <u>San Benito County</u>, <u>California</u>: Benitoite occurs in a number of sites, but gemstone quality material has only been found in California.

I was lucky enough to go shopping at the AFMS Show in New York with Jim Brace-Thompson and purchased my first specimen of Benitoite. (Thanks Jim)!

## JUNIORS ACTIVITIES By Jim Brace-Thompson

#### New Manual for AFMS/FRA Badge Program & Safeguarding Children

I'm pleased to report I have completed my latest update and revision of the Badge Manual for the AFMS Future Rockhounds of America program. This includes five new badges covering Special Effects (magnetism, asterism and cat's eye, double refraction, crystal phantoms, etc.), Fluorescent Minerals, The World in Miniature (miniature, thumbnail, and micromount minerals and fossils, and sand collecting), Reaching Across Generations (encouraging kids to partner and work with seniors in their clubs - a unit suggested and designed by a junior!), and Maps.

I've made revisions throughout the manual. I found recommended websites had evaporated into the ether and needed to be replaced where possible. I added activities here and there based on suggestions from clubs using the program. I've modified other activities and added additional info to tables, etc. It's best if you simply download an entirely new manual from the AFMS website (223 pages, in all). I've printed a limited number of hardcopy manuals for anyone who absolutely can't access it electronically.

Another change to the manual involves advice on safeguarding children. I didn't address this at all in the first edition of the manual in 2004. The Introduction to the second edition in 2008 spoke indirectly about it. Since then, many people have advised that this point needs strong emphasis. If starting a youth program in your local club, you select youth leaders who are well known by all for sound moral values. The vast majority of adults are moral, reliable, responsible, and eager to help as best they can in efforts to educate and nurture our kids in a positive, wholesome environment.

Regrettably, one very unfortunate aspect of the world in which we live is that there are some who would abuse the natural trust of children and who should not be left alone with kids. Some societies require background checks for any members volunteering to work with kids, and this is a good policy to explore with your own club board. Even with all that, we see stories in the news every day, so the second point emphasized in the new manual is the importance of having

multiple adults on hand when working with kids, including parental involvement. Always have multiple adults, and as a group, prevent any sort of abuse, whether physical, sexual, mental, emotional, or verbal. Any obvious or even suspected abuse should be reported and dealt with through proper legal authorities.

For further guidance on this issue, I recommend all Federation-affiliated society board members and youth leaders read the excellent and thorough "Youth Protection" section on the web site of the Boy Scouts of America:

http://scouting.org/Training/YouthProtection.aspx.

This is one aspect of working with kids that can be difficult to discuss, but it's a discussion that absolutely must be held within any club or society endeavoring to start and/or maintain a youth program. The safety of our youth is paramount!

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

## The Value of Membership in the CFMS



From time-to-time, some individuals comment that they don't perceive a lot of <u>value</u> by having their society be a member of the CFMS or having their Federation Director attend the Directors' Meetings.

From their perspective, they wonder if they're



getting their "money's worth" from the current \$8.00-per-member in annual dues and insurance charge (of which only \$1.25 is retained by the CFMS. 75 cents is forwarded to the AFMS and \$6.00 pays for general liability insurance coverage

for each society and its members).

So *who* is the Federation? The Federation is not a distant entity, separated from the individual rock and gem societies. It is not a group of people "out there".... "someplace". The CFMS is a 'federation' of the many member societies and their individual members, working together for our mutual benefit. We often lose sight of this fact.

The Federation is often thought of as those individuals who are 'active' in leadership roles of the CFMS: officers, directors and chairpersons since it is 'they' who are doing the vast majority of Federation work and activities. But these individuals are not the Federation; they are merely the ones who work on behalf of every CFMS member to achieve 'together' those things that cannot be achieved 'alone'. Without the support of each member society and active participation of each society's Federation Director, there would not be a California Federation of Mineralogical Societies.

It is often said: "**Price**" is what you pay for something...... "**Value** is what you receive. So, let's take a moment to see some of the values and benefits that individual societies and their respective members enjoy, either directly or indirectly, as members of the CFMS:

#### 1. Insurance:

- Each member of a Federation Society is covered with \$1 million of liability insurance protection for all of their society-sponsored activities such as, field trips, classes, picnics and potlucks, meetings, etc.
- Certificates of Insurance are provided <u>at no</u> <u>additional cost</u> to member societies for events with less than 500 participants.
- Each society can purchase <u>Optional</u> <u>Additional Insurance</u> protection (at a significant savings) for:
  - 1) their owned or rented/leased premises (including claims)
  - 2) their buildings,
  - 3) their equipment and supplies, and
  - 4) their vendors at rock and gem shows.
- Each society can obtain Directors and Officers Liability protection for a VERY affordable cost: \$250.00 per year.
- Special event insurance is available at an additional premium for events of 500-ormore participants.
- 2. **Earth Sciences**: Members of CFMS societies may attend the annual Earth Science Seminars at Camp Paradise and Zzyzx. For equivalent instruction, the cost would be <u>hundreds</u> of dollars more!
- 3. **Monthly newsletters.** Each society is mailed three issues of the Monthly CFMS and AFMS Newsletters.
- 4. **Web Site.** The CFMS Web site provides Federation information, the CFMS Newsletter, forms, manuals and much more.

- 5. **Field Trips.** There are many Federation Field Trips led by CFMC Field Trips-North and CFMS Field Trips-South committees.
- 6. **Seminars.** Seminars on various subjects are provided by trained personnel.
- 7. **Tax Advice.** Tax advice to societies is provided by Mike Kokinos, CFMS Tax Advisor.
- 8. **Legal Advice.** Legal advice is provided by Jean Klotz, CFMS Legal Advisor.
- 9. **Juniors.** Support for Junior Activities and the Junior Rockhound of America badge program (which is absolutely free to participating Juniors).
- 10. **Scholarship Programs.** Member societies are encouraged to participate in the annual CFMS and AFMS Scholarship Programs (selection of awardees).
- 11. **Demonstrator Committee** provides resources for demonstrators at society functions and shows.
- 12. **Cabochon Cases.** Three displays of cabochons from CFMS societies are available for society shows.
- 13. **Program Aids**. Speakers are available through the Podium People program, providing quality speakers for society meetings.
- 14. **Public Lands Advisory**. This committee monitors legislation and regulations and participates in securing rockhounding rights.
- 15. **Advertising/Promotion:** The CFMS advertises and promotes society shows via the monthly newsletter and the CFMS website.
- 16. **Slide and Video Library.** The CFMS Maintains a library of slide, VHS and DVD programs for use by member societies.
- 17. **Mini Miners Monthly**. As a member society of the Federation, each society with an active Junior Program receives a free electronic copy of the Mini Miners Monthly newsletter (published by Diamond Dan Publications) to help support and expand their society's Junior Program.

There are numerous other services, functions and activities provided by one paid individual (Executive/Secretary/Treasurer/Printer) and dozens of unpaid (i.e. volunteer) officers, directors, and committee chairpersons and committee persons. These (and more) benefits are provided to each member society of the California Federation of Mineralogical Societies - all for only \$8.00 per year.

## **CFMS PLAC-SOUTH**By John Martin, Chair

Our Elected Legislators, Federal and State Agency Decision Makers need to hear from Rockhounds as to our

needs as responsible users of our public lands. Without our inputs the Decision Makers only will have access to less than half of the necessary information needed to make logical decisions on how to manage and maintain our public lands in the best interest of all the users. Without your input, some of our ageing and disabled Rockhounds may no longer enjoy all the collecting sites and recreational areas enjoyed by other groups of recreational users.

The California Off Road Vehicle Association (CORVA), partnered with the Sierra Access Coalition, Plumas and Butte Counties filed suit against the Forest Service to stand up for the rights of all who use public land. This classaction suit against the Plumas National Forest, alleges the Forest Service has violated, equal consideration for the disabled and elderly in their land use plans. Because of their unique circumstances and limited mobility, analysis for vehicular use by these members of society must be considered, and motorized access must be allowed. Although this lawsuit is being filed against one forest, the allegations apply to all areas, agencies, and may well change the future of land use decisions for years to come.

Contacting the elected officials and Land Managers during the decision making process could eliminate the need for the legal actions as described above. Please take the time to contact elected representatives and land managers during the decision process to let them know Rockhounds are here and have a need for access to use the public lands held in trust and managed for the good of all users.

Another issue that may have an effect on users of the National Forest land to collect on or just enjoy the mountains and forests is a ruling by the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals in Arizona's Coronado National Forest regarding Adventure Pass. (Angeles, San Bernardino, Cleveland and Los Padres national forests).

The 15-page decision says any member of the public who walks, hikes, rides a horse, picnics on the side of a road, camps at undeveloped sites, even parks in a national forest "without using facilities and services" is allowed to do so without being charged. Charging a fee even for someone

who visits an area with amenities but doesn't use them, violates the Federal Lands and Recreation Enhancement Act], according to the decision.

## ORDERING PROGRAM MATERIALS

Happy Spring Everyone! Firstly, I would like to thank everyone who ordered a program, used it and returned it promptly with payment and feedback. We need that feedback! Because of it, we now know that one disk may be scratched and one or two slides may be damaged. Good news is welcome also and we received some of that, too, in the form of compliments on the quality of several of the programs.

Suggestions to Facilitate a Smooth Process of Ordering and Return of Materials:

- 1. Complete the entire online form being sure to include both mailing address, e-mail and phone number.
- 2. Submit your request thirty (30) days in advance of your program date.
- 3. Let me know when you receive the program by e-mail or phone: <a href="mailto:sharonrr@cox.net">sharonrr@cox.net</a>, 702-499-0272.
- 4. Try to establish that the equipment that you will be using is in good working order so that there will be no damage to the materials and you will have a good program.
- 5. You may want to do a test run to make sure that there are no glitches!
- 6. Return the program with feedback and payment within ten (10) days or so and write your club name and the program name in the memo line of the check.

## TAX REMINDER By Pat LaRue CFMS Tax Consultant

Most small tax-exempt organizations whose annual gross receipts are normally less than \$50,000 (\$25,000 for tax years ending after December 31, 2007 and before December 31, 2010) are required to electronically submit Form 990-N, also known as the e-postcard, unless they choose to file a complete Form 990 or Form 990-EZ instead.

The e-postcard is due every year by the 15<sup>th</sup> day of the 5<sup>th</sup> month after the close of your tax year. For an organization which uses a calendar year, the year ends on December 31 and the due date for filing is May 15. You cannot file until the tax year ends.

How do you do it? Type or paste the following address into your internet browser: <a href="http://epostcard.form990.org">http://epostcard.form990.org</a>. This is a site maintained by a trusted IRS partner, Urban Institute. The form must be completed and filed electronically. There is no paper form. You will need eight items of basic information about your organization:

- employer identification number (EIN)
- tax year
- legal name and mailing address
- any other names the organization uses
- web site address if the organization has one
- confirmation that the organization's annual gross receipts are less than \$50,000 for tax years ending after December 31, 2010.
- if applicable, a statement that the organization has terminated or is termination (going out of business)

Any organization which fails to file this required information 3 years in a row will lose their exempt status and must reapply. This is a time consuming and costly process. Don't let it happen—make sure your club treasurer or other designated person files your organization's return in a timely manner. Please contact Mike Kokinos or me if you have questions or concerns.

#### **UPCOMING FIELD TRIPS**

#### LAVIC SIDING for JASPER

WHEN: Saturday, May 26, at 9:00 AM

**MEET**: South Side of I-40 Fwy at Hector Rd Off ramp, 35 miles east of I-15 and I-40 Intersection. Or 25 miles West of Ludlow for orientation and signin.

WHAT TO BRING: Collecting bags/buckets, rock hammer, spray bottles. This is the heart of the Mojave and the weather can be unpredictable, this time of year so dress accordingly. We will be collecting the world famous Lavic jasper which can come in a multitude of colors and can be brecciate, layered or solid with veins of white, black or blue agate.

The jasper has been found in reds, blacks, yellows, gold's, greens, purples, or any combination and range from tumble sized to football sized. Most found as float. This site covers a vast area between the Pisgah Crater lava fields, the railroad tracks and the dry lake. We will explore various spots here. From the meeting spot we will caravan west to a safe crossing over the tracks then make a number of stops. Bring lunch. This widespread field offers no shade. Gas and food available in Ludlow.

A Waiver of Liability will be signed at the meeting spot. High clearance 4X4 trucks and SUVs *highly recommended* as we will be driving in a sandy wash.

Other materials at this site may include **agates** and **jaspers** with sections of **multi-shaded pink opal**. Nearby is Pisgah Crater, a young volcano with an extensive lava field. For stopovers this general area also offers the southern Cady's for a wide variety of material, a nearby **obsidian field**, Dish Hill for **peridot**, **trilobites** and the Hector Hills for **chalcedony**, **opal & agate**. Bring your rock collecting guides.

Stayovers may camp at a number of undeveloped sites or at the hotel in Ludlow.

Treat the desert with respect - tread lightly and pack it in/pack it out.

## ROCKHOUNDING WORLD CLASS SMITHSONITE at CERRO GORDO

WHEN: Sunday, June 24

**MEET**: Leave from Lee's Frontier Chevron, South end of Lone Pine @ 8:30 a.m.

WHAT TO BRING: High Clearance Vehicles recommended. Graded mountain dirt road, 9 miles. 5000' elevation gain, rock bag or bucket, rock pick, hand rake, squirt bottle, sun screen, hat, gloves, camera? This is a fee dig @ \$5.00 per person, 2 gallons of drinking water minimum and 6 pieces of firewood. More of each will be welcome.

Mineral collecting at this site can be quite rewarding. Cerro Gordo is world renown for: anglesite, anhydrite, argentite, atacamite, aurichalcite, azurite, barite, bindheimite, bouronite, calcite, and caledonite, cermrgyrite, cerussite, ceruantite, chrysocolla, dufrenoysite, dufrenoysite, fluorite, galena, eothite, greenockite, hemimorphite, hollosite, hydrozincite, jamesonite, leadhillite, limonite, linerite, liroconite, malachite, mimetite, plumbgumite, pyrite, quartz, silver, smithsonite, spharlerite, tetrahedrite, willemite and wulfenite.

Of special interest to rockhounders is the **smithsonite**, which is world class.

Nestled high in the Inyo Mountains east of the Sierra Nevada, at an altitude of 8,500 feet, Cerro Gordo, Fat Hill, was discovered to be rich in silver deposits by a group of Mexican miners led by Pablo Flores. The year was 1865. By 1866, Victor Beaudry, a French Canadian, now a merchant at

Fort Independence in Owens Valley, realized there were opportunities at the Cerro Gordo mining camp, and opened a general store on the mountain. He began acquiring mining properties in lieu of overdue accounts and by January of 1868 arranged with Pierre Desormeaux to build ore furnaces. By April of 1868, Beaudry acquired more properties which included the richest claims on the hill, the Union, the San Lucas, the San Felipe and more.

That same April, Victor Beaudry claimed more and more properties around Cerro Gordo, Mortimer Belshaw came in to town. He became part owner of the Union Mine, as well. June 1868, Belshaw processed ore in one of the Mexican furnaces, then brought the first wagon load of silver into the sleepy pueblo of Los Angeles. He built the Yellow Grade road from Owens dry lake to Cerro Gordo, in July of 1868, so equipment could be taken to the mines, and the ore taken down the mountain. He also built his own smelters to process that ore, in much larger volumes than Victor Beaudry was capable of. By December of 1868, regular shipments of silver bullion were going to Los Angeles. Silver ingots 18 inches long, and weighing 85 pounds, were worth from 20-35 dollars. Cerro Gordo was being hailed as another Comstock.
